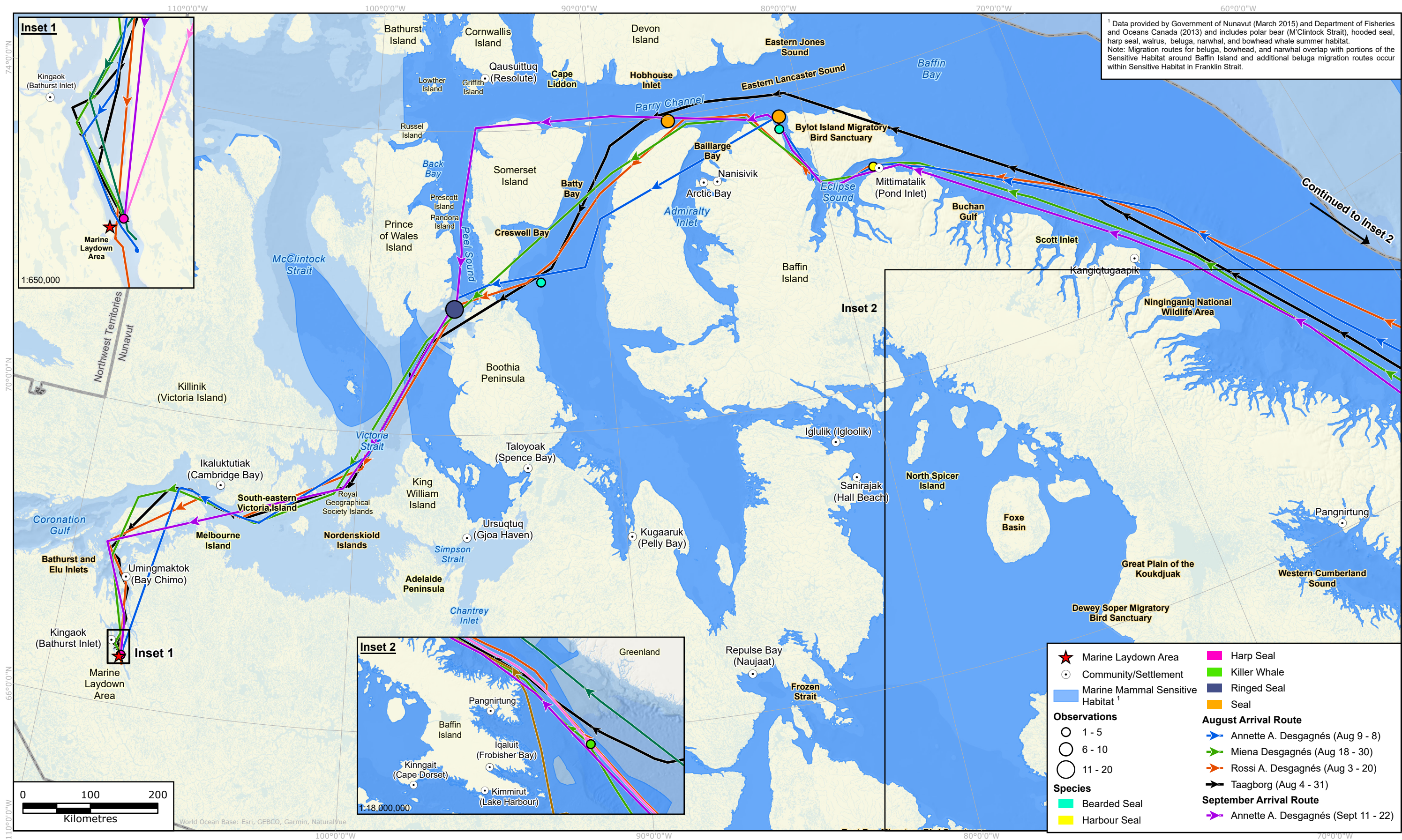


FIGURE 8.2-3 MARINE MAMMAL OBSERVATIONS DURING SHIPPING, AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER 2025



Four seal species were observed in 2025. Bearded seal was observed on two occasions, first on August 17 south of Creswell Bay east of Somerset Island resting on ice, and again on September 19 north of Baffin Island near the Bylot Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary (Figure 8.2-3). Other sightings of seal included harp seal in the Bathurst Inlet near the MLA, 15 ringed seals near Peel Sound, and 1 harbour seal southeast of Bylot Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary, all observed in August (Figure 8.2-3). Two additional sightings of unidentified seals were observed north of Baffin Island, both observed in August and in 2 separate groups of 10 animals. Ringed seal is ranked as Special Concern by COSEWIC (Government of Canada 2026). No mitigative measures or ship strikes were recorded incidentally or through dedicated survey, and as such, no adaptive management measures were triggered by this program.

8.2.2.3 SEABIRD SIGHTINGS

During 2025, 87 separate bird sightings of 446 individual birds were recorded by crew members on 5 trips (Annette Desgagnés on two separate trips, Miena Desgagnés, Rossi A. Desgagnés, and Taagborg) between August 15 and October 2. A total of 15 bird species were observed that were identified to species, and an additional 6 sightings of birds that were not identified to species (Table 8.2-3; Figure 8.2-4; Appendix H).

Unidentified Gulls were the most recorded sighting (151 individuals observed over 33 separate sightings). Northern Fulmar (43 individuals observed over 9 separate sightings) was the most observed species identified to the species level, followed by Canada Goose (40 individuals in two groups of approximately 20), and unidentified Shearwater species (28 individuals observed over 5 observations). The only observations recorded within Bathurst Inlet were of geese (Figure 8.2-4). No mitigative measures or ship strikes were recorded, and as such, no adaptive management measures were triggered by this program.

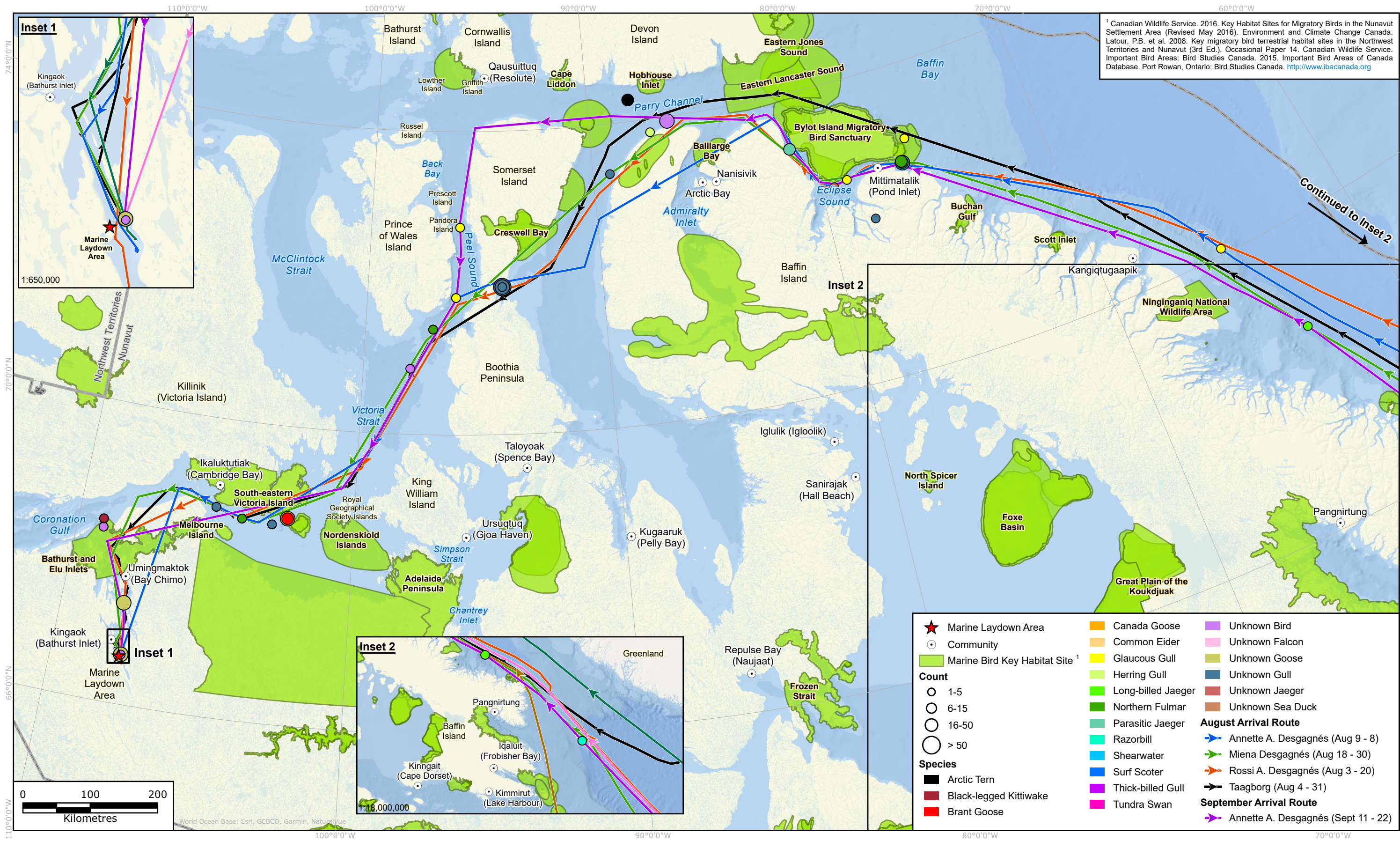
8.3 SEAL LAIR MITIGATION AND MONITORING

In 2025, B2Gold Nunavut did not construct the on-ice airstrip at the MLA and construction of the WIR along Bathurst Inlet was completed prior to February 15; therefore, no pre-construction surveys were required.

As part of the operation of the MLA, B2Gold Nunavut may construct an on-ice landing strip for aircraft on the sea ice in front of the MLA and may construct the WIR to transport equipment and supplies from the MLA to the Goose Mine. The WIR routes south on sea ice from the MLA to the mouth of the Western River before heading inland. Construction of both on-ice infrastructure is generally scheduled for December and January of each year they are required, which is prior to the seal pupping season (which begins approximately February 15).

NIRB Condition #63 and Section 14.2.2.3 of the WMMP Plan (B2Gold Nunavut 2024) indicate that if construction of the on-ice landing strip or the WIR occurs during the seal pupping period (i.e., after February 15), then pre-construction surveys will be conducted, and construction will be altered to avoid any identified seal lairs. As construction of the WIR between the MLA and the Western River occurred prior to February 15 in 2025, no pre-construction surveys were required.

8.4 INCIDENTAL OBSERVATIONS

All personnel are responsible for recording wildlife sightings in the camp's wildlife logs (Appendix G). These logs provide an indication of the wildlife species that occur in proximity to and interact with the Goose Project. Section 3.10 summarizes the number of personnel onsite collecting incidental sightings.

8.4.1 METHODS

All personnel are expected to report incidental observations of marine mammals. Incidental observation reports include location (GPS coordinates), date, time, species, number observed, behaviour, and any other descriptive information regarding the sighting.

Incidental observations were recorded in accordance with and using the data sheet provided in the *Incidental Wildlife Observations SOP* (B2Gold Nunavut 2025k).

8.4.2 RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

In 2025, one incidental observation of an unidentified seal breathing hole (January 22) and one observation of an unidentified seal swimming next to a ship (August 24) were recorded by site personnel near the MLA (Appendix G). The seal breathing hole was observed at km 19.5 along the WIR, however no seal was present. The hole was flagged off until a survey was completed to confirm there was no lair in the area. Since no sensitive features were identified during the survey, works in the area continued as planned. No other sightings of marine mammals were recorded by site personnel in 2025.

9. WILDLIFE INCIDENTS AND MORTALITIES

Wildlife incidents and mortalities are recorded by B2Gold Nunavut and are reported in accordance with NIRB Conditions #46 and #59. An incident is an interaction where there is an active deterrent action, or if direct harm, injury, damage, or wildlife mortality occurs. Various processes are in place and are undertaken by B2Gold Nunavut to mitigate for interactions, incidents, and mortalities.

9.1 WILDLIFE INCIDENTS INVOLVING DETERRENTS OR HAZING

During the 2025 reporting period, there were a total of 42 wildlife incidents that involved the use of deterrents or hazing (Table 9.1-1; Appendix I). Types of deterrence/hazing used in 2025 included bear bangers, truck and air horns, snowmobiles, helicopters, twin otter planes, trucks, yelling, jumping up and down, and placing vinegar and garlic. Deterrents were deployed to deter fox species ($n = 21$), grizzly bears ($n = 5$), wolverines, ($n = 4$), wolves ($n = 4$), caribou ($n = 7$), and Common Raven ($n = 1$).

Foxes were deterred 12 times by personnel, vehicles, flashing lights, bear bangers, or the use of garlic and vinegar. Helicopters and bear bangers were used to deter grizzly bears five times and wolves four times. Wolverines were deterred four times using yelling, bear bangers, and twin otter aircraft and snowmobiles to encourage individuals to move out of the areas. A Common Raven was deterred once using a bear banger observed flying near Echo Pit. Deterrent for bears, wolves, wolverine, and Common Raven were successful each time and resulted in the animals moving away without incident.

Deterrence of caribou observed near the Goose Airstrip was completed twice on July 15 and once on October 21, and at the MLA Airstrip once on August 28. These caribou required the use of gentle hazing methods due to their close proximity to the airstrip with inbound air traffic (Section 2.4). Personnel implemented hazing to push the animals away from the airstrip four times over the three dates, including driving trucks slowly towards the animals, flashing lights, and walking towards the animal. On all occasions, the caribou moved away from the airstrip and measures were determined to be effective. Caribou were observed three times at the Umwelt Pit during pre-blast surveys on May 3, 4, and 5 and were effectively deterred by personnel, refer to Section 2.5 for further information.

9.2 WILDLIFE MORTALITIES

During the 2025 reporting period, there were a total of 16 wildlife mortalities reported at the Goose Project (Table 9.2-1), 10 of which were Arctic hare or unidentified Ptarmigan species. The remaining 6 mortalities were of VEC species and included 4 caribou, 1 fox, and 1 Rough-legged Hawk (Figure 9.2-1). Mortalities occurred as a result of vehicle collision ($n = 7$), unknown causes (likely natural; $n = 4$), natural predation ($n = 3$), interaction with site infrastructure ($n = 1$), and euthanasia ($n = 1$).

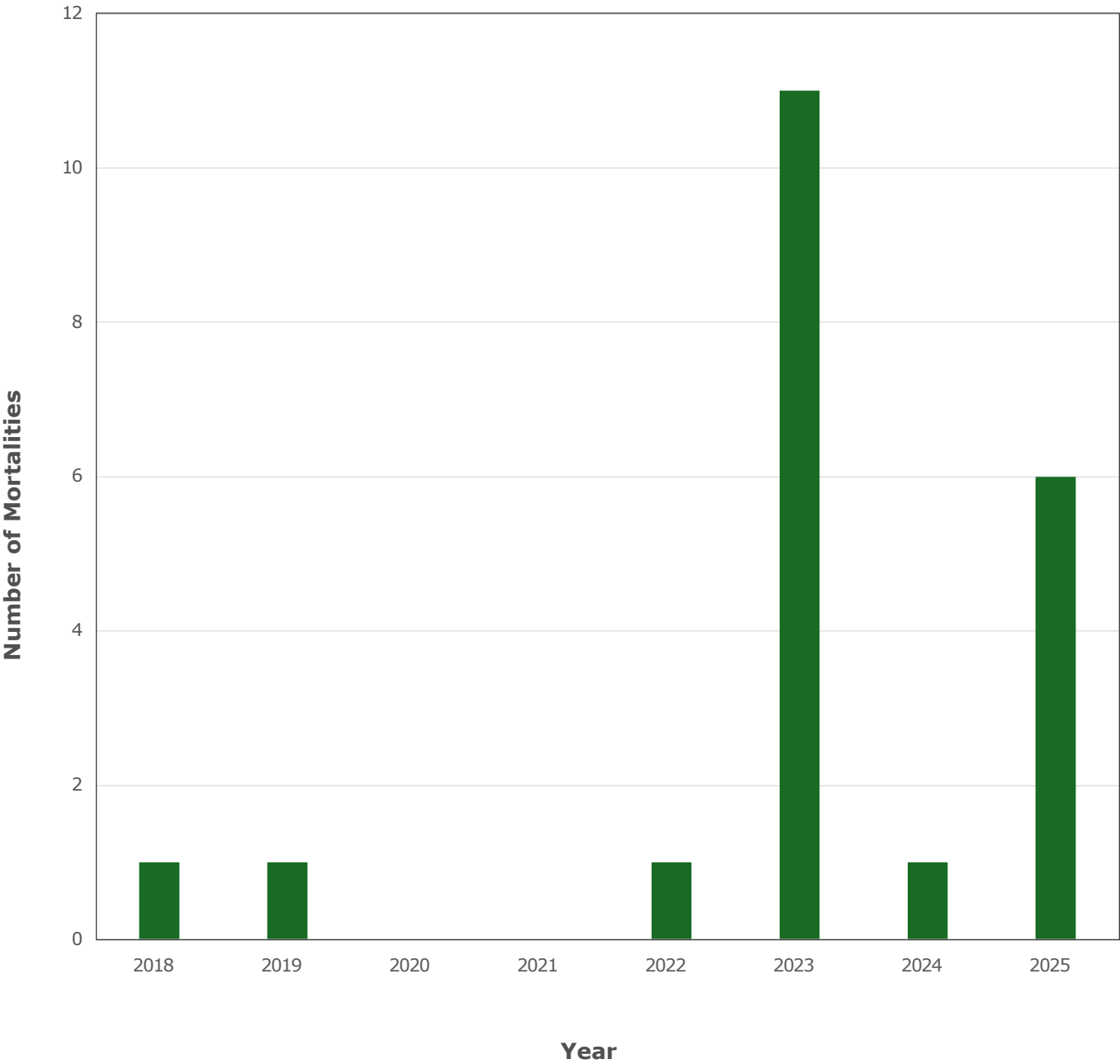

Mortalities Recorded

The seven vehicle-related wildlife mortalities all involved Arctic hare. Three mortalities were reported immediately following the vehicle collision and four were reported when a deceased hare was observed on or near the road. Five of these vehicle-related wildlife mortalities were reported between January 11 to May 6, and two were reported in the fall (September 28 and November 18).

There were four caribou mortalities reported near the Goose Project in 2025. Two were the result of wolf predation (one on March 31 and the other on April 17), both observed adjacent to the WIR. The other two caribou mortalities were of decomposing carcasses, one observed at Llama Lake on August 24, and the other on December 29 at Lake 6. None of the caribou mortalities were due to activities associated with the Goose Project.

Two additional mortalities resulting from natural causes were reported in 2025: one Rough-legged Hawk and one unidentified Ptarmigan. The Rough-legged Hawk mortality occurred on May 18 at the WIR construction laydown. The bird was reported as injured or sick to the Environment Department, who then notified the appropriate Conservation Officers. The area was cordoned off to prevent access to the area and the bird was confirmed to be deceased late in the day.

One mortality resulting from site infrastructure involved an unidentified Ptarmigan, which was found deceased next to a building near the airstrip on May 21. The cause of death was presumed to be a collision with the building window and the carcass was incinerated.

One Arctic fox was euthanized on February 17, 2025, due to habituation to human activity. Behaviours observed by B2Gold Nunavut included the fox entering the underground portal as far as 1 km, accessing food waste (i.e., coffee grounds), and lack of fear of humans (i.e., the fox would return shortly after the use of deterrents). Various deterrent methods were attempted, including humans shouting, vehicle horns, air horns, the removal of any attractants, and notifications to all staff, all of which proved to be ineffective. The Environment Superintendent sought further guidance from the GN Kitikmeot Regional Wildlife Manager to explore any further mitigation options. It was agreed that in the interest of public safety and the animal's welfare, that the animal be euthanized in a humane manner, as per direction from the GN DOE. An incident report for this event was submitted to the GN.

All mortality events were recorded and reported internally to Environment Department staff and followed methods and guidelines provided in B2Gold Nunavut's onsite *Incidental Wildlife Observations SOP* (B2Gold Nunavut 2025k), which includes instructions for recording incidents and mortalities. The incident reports for wildlife mortalities in 2025 are included in Appendix I.

In accordance with NIRB Condition #46, incident reports contain sufficient detail to demonstrate how monitoring and mitigation measures failed to prevent the mortality, as well as information pertaining to what measures were put in place to prevent the incident from reoccurring. Incident reporting was conducted for all mortalities and adaptive management measures were recorded when they were implemented.

In accordance with NIRB Condition #59, all incidents of migratory bird mortalities associated with project activities will be recorded and reported to ECCC. In 2025, there were no migratory bird mortalities associated with onsite activities, resulting in no reports to ECCC.

10. SPECIES OF CONSERVATION CONCERN

NIRB Condition #55 requires B2Gold Nunavut to ensure mitigation and monitoring is updated regularly to maintain consistency with changes to species at risk listings. Species of conservation concern known to occur or potentially occurring in the Goose Project area are presented in Table 10-1. The table of species at risk is updated annually to reflect the most up-to-date information for species, statuses, and known/potential occurrence at the site.

Species of conservation concern include those listed in Nunavut by the Canadian Endangered Species Conservation Council (CESCC; 2022), or those listed as Endangered, Threatened, or Special Concern on Schedule 1 of SARA (Government of Canada 2026). Changes to the territorial or federal species statuses since the 2024 WMMP report are highlighted in Table 10-1 and include the following status changes:

- Territorial Status Updates (NatureServe 2026):
 - Caribou (Dolphin and Union herd): Imperilled to Vulnerable;
 - Caribou (Peary Caribou): Imperilled to Vulnerable;
 - Red Knot (*Calidris canutus islandica*): Apparently Secure to Vulnerable; and
 - Fin Whale (*Balaenoptera physalus*): Unrankable to Unrankable / Not Listed.
- Federal Status Updates (Government of Canada 2026):
 - Red Knot (*Calidris canutus rufa*): Endangered / Not Listed to Special Concern / Endangered / Endangered; and
 - Red Knot (*Calidris canutus islandica*): Special Concern to Not Listed.

Multiple updated recovery strategies, action plans, or management plans for the listed species have been made available since 2013. Updates for species observed at the Goose Project include management plans made available for Peregrine Falcon in 2017 (ECCC 2017a) and Short-eared Owl in 2018 (ECCC 2018a). Updates for species that may occur at the Goose Project or be encountered along the shipping route include management plans made available for barren-ground caribou, Dolphin and Union population, in 2018 (ECCC 2018b), Peary caribou in 2022 (ECCC 2022a), Buff-breasted Sandpiper (*Tryngites subruficollis*) in 2022 (ECCC 2022b), Horned Grebe in 2022 (ECCC 2022c), and Red-necked Phalarope (*Phalaropus lobatus*) in 2023 (ECCC 2023). Additionally, a recovery strategy and management plan for the Red Knot was made available in 2017 (ECCC 2017b). Recovery strategies were made available for Ross's Gull (*Rhodostethia rosea*) in 2007 (ECCC 2007) and Ivory Gull (*Pagophila eburnea*) in 2014 (ECCC 2014). Most recently, a new proposed management plan for Polar Bears (*Ursus maritimus*) was developed in 2025 (ECCC 2025). The WMMP Plan (B2Gold Nunavut 2024) includes mitigation, management, and monitoring activities for each of the species at risk groups listed in Table 10-1. No additional mitigation, management, or monitoring is required due to the change in status listed above.
