IDENTIFICATION OF ISSUE	
<p>Currently Geographical information systems (GIS) are used to spatially map project attributes and valued environmental components (VEC's) in Nunavut. GIS software uses base maps, and allows users to overlay and/or manipulate spatial data of interest. With the use of GIS, technical staff are able to map out project attributes and VECs, highlighting potential areas of concern and effects the project could have on the environment (i.e. migration routes, calving grounds, watersheds).</p> <p>Currently there is no set format for how a Proponent submits the geographical attributes of a project to the NIRB (i.e. surficial extent, infrastructure, etc.). This has therefore led to difficulties when creating spatial representation for projects.</p>	
REVIEWER'S RECOMMENDATIONS	
<p>The GN recommends that the NIRB standardize the means by which Proponents report the spatial attributes of their projects. The GN also recommends that Proponents be required to provide detailed geographical references and attributes (i.e. UTM coordinates, spatial boundaries) of their project(s) to the NIRB. For larger projects, the GN recommends Proponents submit project-specific shape files to streamline the review of a project's spatial attributes.</p>

IDENTIFICATION OF ISSUE	
<p>The regional Socio-Economic Monitoring Committee's (SEMC's), led by the Government of Nunavut's Department of Economic Development and Transportation, are often identified in Project Certificate Terms and Conditions as responsible bodies. While Proponents are given the primary direction, the SEMC's end up playing a supporting role in the development and implementation of most socio-economic related Terms and Conditions.</p> <p>Despite the significant proportion of socio-economic related Terms and Conditions in a given Project Certificate, it does not appear there is a commensurate share of this content in the NIRB's annual community information sessions. Further, the NIRB's annual monitoring reports do not acknowledge the work of the SEMC's and their role in Project Certificate compliance.</p>	
REVIEWER'S RECOMMENDATIONS	
<p>The Government of Nunavut recommends the NIRB engage the Socio-Economic Monitoring Committee Chairs and/or coordinating staff in advance of their annual community information sessions on the content of their presentation materials. Further, the NIRB should continue to accommodate the inclusion of other parties with responsibilities under Project Certificates on site tours, including representatives of the SEMC's. These site tours should give appropriate weighting to relevant socio-economic terms and conditions in their investigations.</p>
