<b>CONCERNS</b>	
<p>A search of the Nunavut Archaeological Site Database indicates that there are no recorded archaeological sites in the proposed exploration area. This however does not preclude the presence of unidentified sites or cultural features as to this day no systematic archaeological reconnaissance has been conducted in this area.</p> <p>The proponent plans an extension of activities for the existing exploration program from 2019 through 2024. The proposed land use activities include the building of an incinerator, use of campsite, drilling, sampling, prospecting and geophysics in six claim locations. The Department of Culture and Heritage is concerned with the amount of ground disturbance that can occur from an unspecified amount of drilling activity during the duration of the project.</p> <p>Furthermore, the proposed exploration area is located in prime caribou hunting ground that has been traditionally used and continued to be used extensively by both Iglulingmiut and people from Hall Beach. Although not yet recorded, this general area is clustered with archaeological sites attesting of the intensity of use over several millennia.</p>	
<b>SUGGESTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS</b>	
<p>On the basis that no archaeology surveys have been conducted in the proposed exploration areas and that potential for the presence of archaeological resources is extremely high the Department of Culture and Heritage recommends that a field archaeology assessment program be initiated prior to any land disturbance activities.</p> <p>The 2019-2024 archaeological field program should consist of the:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1) Assessment of the complete footprint of the camp and incinerator area and associated components (heliport, roads, etc.);</li> <li>2) Assessment of any drilling locations (50 m radius) and water-hose route to the closest water source intake;</li> <li>3) Assessment of any sampling, prospecting, and all other locations where land disturbance activities are planned to occur.</li> </ol> <p>Thorough archaeological assessment will assist in determining the archaeological potential of the area and formulating mitigation plans for any archaeological resources that will be affected by the development.</p>	

No activities be conducted in the vicinity (50 m buffer zone) of any archaeological/historical sites. If archaeological sites or features are encountered, activities should immediately be interrupted and moved away from this location. Each site encountered needs to be recorded and reported to our office.

All archaeological and palaeontological sites in Nunavut are protected by law. The applicant must understand that it is their responsibility to ensure that no heritage resource sites are disturbed in the course of their activities. No person shall alter, or otherwise disturb an archaeological site, or remove any artifact from an archaeological site. Moreover, the building of inuksuit is not recommended.
