RE: NANUQ PROJECT - NIRB FILE 08EN002 – ANNUAL REPORT CALENDAR YEAR 2025

Peregrine Diamonds Ltd. (Peregrine) was purchased by De Beers Canada Inc. (De Beers) in September 2018 and is now a wholly owned subsidiary of De Beers.

The following letter is the annual Nunavut Impact Review Board (NIRB) report for the Nanuq Project (file #08EN002) for calendar year 2025.

Project Location

The Nanuq Project is located 280 kilometers north-northeast of Rankin Inlet in the Kivalliq Region of Nunavut. All activities occur within the confines of 1:250,000 scale National topographic sheet 56G.

Project Permits & Licencing

De Beers subsidiary Peregrine holds a class “A” land use permit N2025C0008 from CIRNAC which commenced on June 1, 2025 and expires on May 31, 2030. The permit authorizes an exploration camp at the Nanuq Project. Peregrine also held corresponding water use permit 2BE-NAN1823 which commenced on August 24, 2018 and expired on August 23, 2023. The project was assigned file number 02EN002 by the NIRB in 2008.

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Fieldwork 2025 & Project Status

No fieldwork was conducted in 2025. The Nanuq Project is currently under care and maintenance.

The site was last visited by a helicopter company in late October 2022. The camp was intact and in good condition. In August 2024 De Beers contracted a satellite to take photos of the Nanuq camp and surrounding area. The camp was intact and appeared to be in similar condition as in 2022.

Project History

Mineral tenure was first acquired at the Nanuq Project in the form of prospecting permits in February 2003. In July 2003 the Nanuq Camp was established and the first fieldwork conducted which consisted of till sampling and an airborne geophysics. In 2005 the first mineral claims were recorded and the first core drilling completed.

The last drill program occurred in 2011 and the last exploration program consisted of a one-day till sampling program in 2014. In 2016 the Nanuq Camp was partially demobilized. No field work has been undertaken since 2016.

Project expenditures on the Nanuq Project are in excess of \$11,000,000.00.

Mineral Tenure

The project formerly consisted of 125 mineral claims with an aggregate area of 156,911 hectares. These claims were subject to a section 51 suspension of work requirements issued by the Nunavut Mining Recorder.

Peregrine suspended all exploration activities on the Nanuq Project because recent editions of the draft Nunavut Land Use Plan designated much of the project area as prohibited to mining and exploration.

Project Infrastructure

The Nanuq Project has one field camp (Nanuq Camp) located west of the adjacent Lorillard River. The camp was partially demobilized in 2016 and currently consists of three wooden cabins, a wooden platform, an outhouse, core boxes and incinerator. All

buildings are secure and bolted shut. There are some drill timbers located on a sand airstrip approximately one kilometer south of the camp. No fuel is stored at camp or cached in the field.
